Ko e kanisaa' ko ha mahaki 'eni 'i he fanga ki'i sela (cells) 'o e sino'. 'Oku toutou fa'u ma'u pē 'e hotau sino' ha ngaahi sela fo'ou ke fetongi'aki 'a e ngaahi sela kuo motu'a mei' he lahi 'o hono ngāue'aki', pē ke faito'o'aki 'a e ngaahi sela kuo maumau hili ha lavea. Ko e founiga ko 'eni' 'oku mapule'i ia 'e ha fa'ahinga naunau tukufakaholo 'i he toto' (genes): ko e ngaahi kouti pe faka'ilonga eni 'oku nau fakahā ki hotau ngaahi sela' 'a e founiga ke faito'o'aki kinautolu' pea mo e tō'onga ke ne fakahoko'. 'Oku tupu 'a e ngaahi kanisaa' mei' he ngaahi maumau ko ia ki he naunau tukufakaholo ko 'eni 'i he toto'. Ko e ngaahi maumau ko 'eni' 'oku fa'a hoko ia lolotonga 'o 'etau mo'ui', neongo ko e fa'ahinga tokosi'i 'oku nau ma'u ha ngaahi naunau tukufakaholo 'i honau toto' kuo 'osi maumau pē ia mei he'enau mātu'a' 'i he taimi 'oku fa'ele'i ai kinautolu'. Kapau kuo 'osi maumau 'a e ngaahi naunau tukufakaholo ia ko 'eni 'i he toto', 'e anga kehe leva 'a 'enau tō'onga'. Te nau ala tupu 'o hoko ko ha lama (tumour lump) 'a ia 'oku benign pe ngali lelei pē ('ikai ko ha kanisā) pe malignant pe ngali fakatu'utāmaki (ma'u 'e he kanisaa').

Ko e ngaahi lama 'oku 'ikai ko ha kanisaa' 'oku 'ikai ke nau mofele ki ha ngaahi konga kehe 'o e sino' kā ko e kanisaa' 'oku malava ke mofele.





Introduction

Cancer is a disease of the body's cells. Our bodies are always making new cells to replace worn-out cells, or to heal damaged cells after injury. This process is controlled by certain genes: the codes that tell our cells how to heal and behave. Cancers are caused by damage to these genes. This damage usually happens during our lifetime, although a small number of people inherit a damaged gene from a parent when they are born. If genes are damaged they can behave abnormally. They may grow into a tumour (lump) which may be benign (not cancer) or malignant (cancer).

Benign tumours do not spread to other areas of the body whereas cancer has the ability to spread.



Cancer is not catching. It cannot be passed from one person to another.


There are many ways of treating cancer such as surgery, chemotherapy and radiation treatment. Talk to your doctor about what is best for you. Many cancers can be successfully treated.

'I he taimi te ke fanongo ai 'oku' ke ma'u 'a e kanisaa', 'oku mahino 'e ngali ke mou ilifia mo ho famili' pea 'e ngali lahi foki mo ha'o ngaahi fehu'i. Ko ha lisi eni 'o ha ngaahi fehu'i ke tokoni atu kiate koe ke ke ma'u 'a e lelei taha te ke ala lava' mei ho'o taimi mo ho'o toketaa'.

When you hear you have cancer you and your family may feel understandably frightened and you may have many questions. Having your questions answered can help you feel in control of your situation. Here is a list of questions to help you make the most of your time with your doctor.
